

3. Academic counselling support for DSC, DSE and LSE Courses

The counselling sessions will be organised with a two hours duration. The time-table is prepared accordingly and is given in Annexure - VI A & B.

7. STUDENT EVALUATION SYSTEM

a. The Approach

- The student evaluation system focuses on assessment of learning outcomes.
- The examination pattern is designed by taking note of weightage of credits and system of teaching learning methods of various courses.
- The credibility and reliability of conduct of examinations is strictly maintained.
- All CBCS courses are credit based.
- The absolute grading system as suggested by U.G.C is followed.

b. The Grading Scale

Grading is the core of the CBCS, which reduces the subjective element of evaluation thereby preventing disadvantage to students. Grade is the index of performance of students in a course. Grade is the transformation of scaled marks secured by a student in a particular course. Grade point is numerical weightage attached to each grade on a 10 point scale depending on the range of marks awarded in a course.

Note:

- i. In case of End semester exams the marks allocation will be suitably changed.
- ii. The numerical score of marks for courses with less than 100 total will be converted to 10 points scale in the Grading Scale.
- iii. The SGPA (Semester Grade Point Average) and CGPA (Cummulative Grade Point Average) pattern suggested by UGC will be followed to award Grades to the students.

Pattern of Examination and Minimum marks to Pass

- a) For all courses, Semester-End Examination Question Paper consists of 3 sections, viz., Section-A, B and C. Section-A : contain Short Answer Questions, Section-B : Long Answer Questions and Section-C : Outcome-based/Application Orientated Questins.
- b) Student should secure a Minimum of 40% of the Maximum Marks allotted in all the courses of Semester-end Examinations.
- c) For each 5 - Credit Course, the maximum marks allotted for Semester - end Examination is 100 and of which 20 marks is allotted to Section-A, 60 marks to Section-B and 20 marks for Section-C. Further Section-A : Consists of Ten Short Answer Questions out of which the student is required to answer any Five Questions in about 10 lines each. Two questions from each block will be framed in this section. Each question carries four marks (5x4=20 marks). Section-B : Consists of Five Long Answer Questions with internal choice. Questions will be framed from each of the Five Blocks and the student is required to answer any one using the internal choice. Questions will be given in Either/Or format. The student is required to answer all the five questions in 30 lines each. Each question carries 12 marks (5 x 12 = 60 marks). Section-V : Consists of Two Outcome-based / Application Orientated questions to test the understanding of student on the subject. The student is required to answer any one out of these two questions in about 50 lines. This question carries 20 marks. The duration of examination is Three Hours.
- d) In the case of practical oriented courses, out of five credits, four credits are assigned to theory and one credit to practicals. Accordingly, 20 marks are assigned to Practical Examination and 80 marks to Semester-end Theory Examination. The Semester-end question paper is divided into three sections.

Section-A : Comprises of Eight Short Answer Questions, out of which the student is required to answer any four question about 10 lines each. Each question carries Five marks (4x5=20 marks).

Section-B : Comprises of Four Long Answer Questions with internal choice (Either/ or Format) and the student is required to answer all four questions in 30 lines each. Two questions from each block will be framed in this section. Each question carries 10 marks (4x10=40 marks).

Section-C : Consists of Two questions which are of outcome - based / application orientated, to test the understanding of student on the subject. The student is required to answer any one of these two question in about 50 lines. This Question carries twenty marks (1 x 20 = 20 Marks). The duration of the Examination is three hours.

- e) For 3-Credit Courses, as each course has three blocks, the maximum marks for Semester-end Theory Examination will be 60 and out of which 18 marks are to be allotted to Section-A, 30 marks to Section-B, and the remaining 12 marks will be allotted to Section-C. In Section-A, Six Short Answer questions are given, where the student is required to answer Three Short Answer Questions in 15 lines each. Each question carries Six marks (3 x 6 = 18 marks). In Section-B, Three Long Answer questions with Either/Or choice will be given from each block. The student is required to answer all questions using internal choice in 25 lines and each question carries 10 marks. (3x10=30 marks). Section-C: Consists of Two outcome-based questions to test the understanding of student on the course and application orientated. The student is required to answer any one out of these two questions in about 30 lines. Each question carries twelve marks (1x12=12 Marks). The duration of the examination is 2 hours.
- f) For 2-Credit Courses, as each course has two blocks, the maximum marks for the Semester-end-Examination will be 40. Out of which, 12 marks are allotted to Section-A, 20 marks are allotted to Section-B, and the remaining 8 marks allotted to Section-C. In Section-A, four Short Answer Questions are given and the student is required to answer any two questions in 15 lines each. Each question carries six marks (2x6=12 marks). In Section - B, two Long Answer Questions are given with Either/Or choice from each block and each question carry 10 marks (2 x 10 = 20 marks). The student is required to answer all questions using internal choice in 25 lines. Section-C : Consists of Two outcome-based questions to test the understanding of student on the subject and application orientated. The student is required to answer any one out of these two questions in about 20 lines. Each question carries eight marks (1x8=8 Marks). The duration of the Examination is one and half hours.

The University conducts one examination every day. Thus for the semesters from first through fourth, the examinations will be held at the rate of 7 days each and for the fifth and sixth semesters, the examinations will be at the rate of 6 days each.
